# AAUW Seattle Branch Elections in May - Gay Armsden

Strategy Steering Team Meets Again - Barbara Sando On April 3<sup>rd</sup>, the Strategy Steering Team met for the second time, to review progress on each of the Situation-Target-Proposal (STP) plans. It had been a year since our smaller team had first met with our facilitator, and 11 months since the larger team had kicked off to embark on collecting data from our members about Seattle Branch - where we were and where we need to head to ensure a strong and stable future. The **Publicity & Marketing** 



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team has made excellent progress in identifying a firm with which we can work to effectively get the word out on AAUW, we hope as soon as this fall. The Diversity & Inclusion team met in late March to brainstorm what diversity means to Seattle Branch. We received a debrief on that session and then discussed. That tied in nicely with the Collaboration team exploring options for other organizations we could partner with. The College & University Partnerships team is focusing on establishing contacts with Seattle Community Colleges, which dovetails with the feasibility study being explored about creating a Branch scholarship program. There were also discussions about various new Interest and Smaller Group functions, as well as exploring different times, days and venues for larger Branch Programs in the future. All of these get-togethers are key to engaging more of our existing membership and attracting new members, too. Finally, there was discussion about Branch Leadership, with a focus on being more inclusive and documenting the jobs that need to be done and streamlining them so that they're less daunting for members to agree to do. The Steering Team will meet again in August. At that time, the budget for 2018-2019 will also be developed and reviewed so that strategic initiatives which require funds can be included. No one said our strategic endeavors would be easy, and they're not. But, we're making progress and that is very encouraging. ## **April Board Meeting Summary** - Marianne North

The Board met via teleconference on April 9<sup>th</sup>. Marianne North was appointed to be Secretary through June 30, 2019. Ann Dennis will attend the AAUW-WA Convention in April. The Board is considering a sponsorship of the Team Awesome Basketball Leadership Academy in July. The book exchange was very successful at the March meeting and we will continue with it when practicable. The Vice President of Finance Lynn Dissinger is looking for someone to do the financial review of our books before the new VP of Finance assumes her duties. The nominating committee is proposing Bev Fogle as Vice President of Finance and Judy Waring has agreed to serve one more term as Vice President of Membership; Robin Hendricks has offered to assist the Membership committee. Robin Hendricks also will be helping Renée Agatsuma with the C/U Relations duties at the UW. A committee chaired by Gay Armsden is proposing the branch provide a scholarship for a community college student transferring to a four-year college. The Branch is co-sponsoring two Start Smart workshops at the UW Women's Center in April and will also co-sponsor the UW Alene Morris Leadership training on June 20<sup>th</sup>. A New Member Reception is planned for September. The Strategic Steering Team met April 3 and summarized its plans for the upcoming year. Potential marketing consultants have been identified and are being interviewed and one should be selected by June.

Between Ann and me, we interviewed all the parents as well. Seattle Branch will be sponsoring nine girls this year, though we had hoped to have more. However, it has proven difficult to get nominations. 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## AAUW Dues and Membership Renewal 2018-2019 - Judy Waring

It's time to pay your dues for the July 1, 2018 to June 30, 2019 membership year. We have begun e-mailing invoices with a personalized link so that you can easily renew your membership using a credit card, no login or password required! National dues have increased from \$49 to \$59—so with state dues of \$10 and branch dues of \$16, the total is now \$85 for Seattle Branch membership. All who have paid their dues by July 1st can attend the September meeting free of charge. I am encouraging you to renew sooner rather than me "bugging you" at the end of summer. ### What's New about the Gender Pay Gap? - Gay Armsden

First, what's *not* new? The pay gap has hardly budged in a decade and continues to be larger for most minority groups and other marginalized women. Currently, men out earn women in 116 of 120 occupations. Women who return to work after having children experience a pay penalty of 4% per child that's not explained by other factors. Even at entry level, women are 18% less likely to get a promotion than men. So, what is new?

<u>Legislation</u>: Pay discrimination is often hidden with policies of secrecy. WA's Equal Pay Opportunity Act, which finally became law in March, bans pay secrecy policies, and also requires any gender pay disparity to be explained with legitimate job-related factors, allows workplace discussion of pay, and prohibits retaliation for seeking equal pay. A recent decision of the 9<sup>th</sup> Circuit Court (an AAUW-supported case) ruled that employers can't legally use prior salary amounts to justify paying men more than women. In this past WA legislative session, bills that would have prohibited an employer from seeking an applicant's salary history did not make it out of committee. Lobby for them next year!

<u>Research</u>: Although recent, rigorous studies differ somewhat in their findings on how much of the pay gap is likely due to plain gender bias (i.e., gender differences remaining after all other factors have been considered), these studies are reporting on new identifiable factors contributing to the pay differences. For example, one Seattle study found that, compared to women, men are much more likely to engage in overtime work, widening the gender pay gap by an estimated 10%. [https://goo.gl/DhY1u7]

<u>Knowledge</u>: Women are more aware of the fact they are less likely than men to negotiate their starting salary or pay raises. Thanks to AAUW and other organizations, there are more salary negotiation workshops for women. More press is being given to strategies to use in asking for pay raises. Although it is still harder for women to climb the corporate ladder, more women are now fully aware when they start out that they will face challenges related to their being female.

<u>Policies</u>: A much higher percentage of companies consider it a priority to hire and retain women. Jobs are being structured and remunerated in new ways that make flexible work schedules more possible.

<u>Numbers</u>: Women now comprise almost 50% of the labor force. More women are also working in positions and fields that have been traditionally occupied by men.

<u>Backwards movement</u>: Large corporations are no longer required to report pay data by race and gender to the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission. The #MeToo movement might have produced a backlash - there are reports of male employers avoiding hiring women in certain jobs to avoid "issues."

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### Seattle Branch Scholar Recognition - Barbara Sando



Our 18<sup>th</sup> annual Scholar Recognition event was, as usual, inspiring, fun and very well attended. Thirty-two scholars from 12 schools were honored this year for their achievements in math, science and technology - all but two of them present at the event with parents, grandparents, siblings, and others who have supported their academic and personal journeys thus far. Over 100 scholars, guests and members

were there to celebrate the students' achievements and be part of our program.

This year's reception was emceed by Renee Agatsuma, and began with Tonna Kutner sharing some great information about AAUW's mission, history and current projects. Tonna also spoke

about Equal Pay Day, sharing the story of Aileen Rizo, an LAF plaintiff
from California who claimed that using prior salary data alone, or in combination with other factors,



cannot justify a wage differential under the Equal Pay Act. After an initial unfavorable ruling in April 2017, the Ninth Circuit ruled in her favor on April 9, 2018 - a much needed victory.

Keynote speaker, UW Professor Dr. Saadia Pekkanen, was introduced by Renee, and she was great. Dr. Pekkanan spoke about "The Prospects of Peace in Outer Space," citing this unique moment in history when both commercialization and militarization of space are being pursued. She talked about the dramatic changes that have occurred in our own area in the past ten years, with Seattle now being a "Space Hub." By sharing information about technical challenges

such as dealing with "orbital debris," Dr. Pekkanen inspired the students about various ways they could use

their STEM education and skills, also emphasizing just how important the associated ethical decisions will be as they do so.

After a short break, Renee presented the Certificates of Excellence and scholarship checks to the students, who each had a chance to briefly tell us something about themselves and their future plans. Wow! These young women will be doing amazing things in the years ahead, many of them in the STEM fields. All in all, it was another great Scholar's night for Seattle Branch. Thanks to all who made it happen!
