Leadership Corner—Barbara Sando

Welcome to a new year of AAUW!

As I begin my final year as branch president, I'm not only proud of what the branch has accomplished, but so excited about what is yet to come. The eight strategic initiatives that we developed in mid-2017 are now in various phases of implementation, and the Seattle Branch horizon will be bright if we are successful. You can read more about our strategic initiatives on page 3. What I'll be



focusing on here, appropriately, is another piece of the "branch future" puzzle -- leadership.

Over the years, I've written many Leadership Corner columns for *The Catalyst*. This is my last one as President, and likely my last for some time. As it does each fall, the Board will appoint a Nominating Committee to identify a slate of candidates for the offices coming up for election at our annual meeting in May. This year, that will be President, VP Programs and Secretary; last May, it was VP Finance and VP Membership. Officer's terms are staggered to ensure continuity on the board, and officers are term limited to ensure that boards don't become stagnant. Both of these are 'best practices' employed by most organizations.

Seattle Branch has been quite fortunate to get some newer members engaged and serving on our board in recent years. "New blood" is always good for getting a broader array of perspectives on discussion issues. Experience is good, too, and we have that in spades. Several of our board members, myself included, have served on the board in various capacities for multiple terms - some of us can even measure our service in decades! Our current board community includes five past presidents, making up one third of that population. While the experience of long-timers is invaluable in many ways, it can also be a handicap in others. We tend to get set in our ways and are not always as open to new possibilities as we might otherwise be -- not to mention, we also get tired or even burned out. Which brings me to my main point....

No matter how many members an organization has, it has no future unless someone is willing to lead it. Corporations do succession planning to convince themselves, and their shareholders, that they have a viable future - that they are a "going concern." We are an all-volunteer non-profit, so have no employees to promote into leadership roles. A "strong and stable future" for our organization depends on our members stepping up to lead Seattle Branch. So, as I begin the sixth and final year of continuous service on the board (as Secretary, then President), I encourage each of you - especially those who have not served on the board in the past - to consider taking on a leadership position. Not only is it a great way to get to better know the wonderful women who are a part of Seattle Branch, you can have an impact on the organization by helping to create its future.

From Strategic Planning to Strategy Implementation - Barbara Sando

On August 7th, the Strategy Steering Team met again, this time both to review the progress of each of the Situation - Target - Proposal (STP) plans *and* to review budgets for the current fiscal year, which includes items related to our strategic plan. It's very exciting to be moving from the 'planning' phase to the 'implementation' phase in many areas. The team accomplished a tremendous amount of work to set in motion many of the suggestions our members gave us



during our data collection interviews a year ago. As with any ambitious list, there were a few ideas that didn't end up coming to fruition for various reasons, as well as others that are still on the path to being implemented in the future. But, we are still full steam ahead!

This strategic planning initiative started in spring 2017 to bring a laser focus on efforts to "ensure a strong and stable ('permanent') future for Seattle Branch" - something both near and dear to the hearts of our members, as well as being the key criteria in our legal agreement for using the income from the Dr. Winifred Weter endowment. While not everything in our plan is funded by Weter, everything in the plan is focused in one way or another on ensuring the Branch continues well into the future. You'll be hearing more about each of these initiatives in the coming months, but here are some highlights.

Seattle Branch now has a marketing consultant on contract, Allison Carney, who is helping us develop a two-year plan. The plan will have tentacles into many other areas, including internal and external communications and collaborations with other, diverse organizations. The latter, along with our branch programs, plan to expand our college and university partnerships to include community colleges, to broaden our reach. We're kicking off a Scholarship Program for community college female students transitioning to 4-year state schools, which is very exciting, and we plan to continue Tech Trek and Scholar Recognition, as well. New interest groups are forming, and there's an increasing focus on smaller group interactions within the Branch. The first new member social in several years will be held in September. Among all of these things, our goal is for every member to find some project or activity that resonates with her own interests and passions, and become engaged with the Branch in realizing the AAUW vision and mission here in Seattle. Over the coming months, the various strategy STP teams will be transitioned back into the Branch board and committee structure so that implementation efforts will be fully integrated going forward. Seattle Branch May Board Meeting - Barbara Sando

The Seattle Branch board met for its last time of the 2017-2018 fiscal year at Penny Tetter's home in mid-May. Discussion focused on reflecting on how completed projects had gone, as well as ensuring all was in place for Tech Trek over the summer. The Board also discussed, and ultimately decided to support and participate in, the Team Awesome Basketball Leadership Academy (TABLA) this summer. The board ensured readiness for the upcoming Annual Meeting and elections. The Board will resume regular monthly meetings in September 2018.

Scholar Recognition - Coordinator Urgently Needed for Continuation of Longtime Program — Barbara Sando

Scholar Recognition is our annual program to honor high school senior women for their achievements in math, science, and technology to encourage them to continue to study these fields in college. We've been

doing this project since 2001, and it's grown slowly each year. Last year, we honored 32 young women from 12 area schools. The Board is committed to this mission-based project and has budget in place to support it. We have a well-established committee with each person working with a school(s) from start to finish. Sounds ideal, right? Unfortunately, there's just one problem - we need a project

coordinator in order to continue Scholar Recognition for 2019!

The coordinator job is well defined and time limited (approximately 10-12 hours for the entire project). The work happens between mid-January, when we first contact the schools, and wraps up by mid

-April when we honor the award recipients at our reception. The coordinator keeps everyone on track by sending e-mail guidance and sample correspondence to the other volunteers at the start of the three main phases of the program. The coordinator also answers any questions the volunteers have along the way, and compiles a list of all of the students to facilitate the Certificates of Excellence and award checks being prepared towards the end. There are no in-person meetings to conduct or attend (until the Reception itself), and the coordinator's work can be done pretty much any time of day or night since it's all by e-mail. The Reception itself is planned by a number of people from the Board, so that task does not fall on the coordinator, though she is involved. The person taking over this job will not be starting from scratch, as copies of everything from last year have been saved.

If you're willing to take on this task, or would like more information as you consider doing so, please contact me as soon as possible at president@aauw-seattle.org. Fingers crossed that someone will step up to lead this project, as it would be a real shame to have to discontinue it.

Seattle Branch May Program & 2018 Annual Meeting - Barbara Sando

Twenty Seattle Branch members, as well as eight guests, attended our Branch Meeting on May 19th. Prior to our well-received speaker, author Mary Lou Sanelli, speaking and sharing form her book "Among Friends", the Annual Meeting was conducted. Branch members elected by acclamation Beverly Fogle as Vice President of Finance/Treasurer and Judy Waring as Vice President of Membership/Membership Chair. Officer terms began July 1st and run through June 30, 2020. No other official business was conducted at the Annual Meeting.





Branch Fall Voter Registration and Assistance Project—Gay Armsden

Members of Seattle Branch will again be helping to 'Get Out The Vote' in September and October. This election year, two efforts are being planned. First, we plan to assist seniors in filling out their ballots and help with any needed signature updates. We already have one senior assistance center interested - Lake City Community Center. To help seniors update their signature, we will need to be at the center before the mail-in deadline of Oct. 8th. To assist seniors in filling out their ballots, we will want to be there not too long after the ballots are mailed out on Oct. 17th.

The second planned effort is helping people register to vote and alerting people about updating their address if they've moved since last voting (locations TBD, but possibly at area community colleges). Our registration drive can be any time before the mail-in deadline of Oct. 8th. One especially good day to be out registering voters is National Voter Registration Day, which is on Sept. 25th. This date is the day after Seattle Colleges start fall classes and the day before Shoreline Community College starts classes.

Want training? Some of our members have attended the excellent voter-registration training given by the League of Women Voters, which will offered in early September (date not yet set). This training typically covers WA state's requirements, King County Elections' expectations, registration changes passed by the Legislature this session, and your responsibilities as a registrar. Seattle Branch Sponsorship at Leadership Camp for Girls— Gay Armsden

Seattle Branch was a sponsor for girls attending the Team Awesome Basketball Leadership Academy (TABLA) in Shoreline in July. TABLA empowers female teen athletes by developing their communication, leadership, and advocacy skills through basketball. TABLA is run by Basketball Education in Action, founded by Bea Chang, which connects girl athletes with women who have been there, done it, and loved it. Four Seattle Branch members were involved with the camp, and all feel that TABLA is very worthy of our support. Marianne North, who gave a short talk to campers on Title IX and sat with Fiona Goodchild at the AAUW-information table at the Community Day, notes, "It was exciting to be among young, energetic women-to watch them on the court and in the workshop on self-awareness." Fiona writes, "I sat in on the panel of college players who talked about how they were recruited and what were the highs and lows of being a member of a college team. The teen players clearly enjoyed getting a chance to plan for their future as an athlete." CJ Nash, who delivered staff lunches, reports, "It felt great that AAUW was providing scholarship support to such high achievers in both athletics and academics," and, "this sponsorship was also a good learning experience for our branch marketing." Gay Armsden coordinated this branch project. Seattle Branch received an appreciative note from Ms. Chang, saying that because of our sponsorship they were able to reduce costs for 8 girls and that they are looking forward to working together again.
