### Leadership Corner—Renée Agatsuma

I am privileged. Because I am: white-passing, middle class, Christian, heterosexual, cis-gendered, able-bodied, and college-educated. All of these identities can provide unearned advantages or disadvantages in society. While I do still face sexism, I don't have it as difficult as others whose intersecting identities make existing in society more difficult. People's entire



identities can be erased. You can see that in the erasure of the transwomen and lesbians of color who were on the frontlines during the Stonewall "Riot" for gay rights in 1969, as well as the erasure of the black woman who started the #MeToo movement. "History" is in the eyes of the victors.

I first started to understand invisible privilege that I carried when I read Peggy McIntosh's 1989 article *Unpacking the Invisible Knapsack* (available in its entirety at https://nationalseedproject.org/Key-SEED-Texts/white-privilege-unpacking-the-invisible-knapsack). She begins with trying to talk to men about the privileges they have in society, and being frustrated when they don't recognize it when it is perfectly obvious to those of us experiencing things like "why don't you smile" on the street. To the men she was trying to reach, the privilege they had was invisible. As she says, "After I realized the extent to which men work from a base of unacknowledged privilege, I understood that much of their oppressiveness was unconscious. Then I remembered the frequent charges from women of color that white women whom they encounter are oppressive. . . I began to understand why we are justly seen as oppressive, even when we don't see ourselves that way . . ." Examples of invisible privilege she (and I, and probably many of us) carry: being able to go pretty much anywhere in the country and see people who look like you, not being followed in the store, never being expected to speak for your own race, and being approached by the police and not having to fear for your life. I think it is vital that we think about these issues, and I encourage you to read the article.

I've talked about privilege and intersectionality in every leadership corner that I've been asked to write, because I think we need to acknowledge privilege as an organization, and figure out ways our organization might unknowingly reaffirm it. We can do that, and continue to grow. We have been doing better in recent years, but we still have a ways to go. Let's continue to make progress in this critical area.



Tech Trek interviews are in process. So far we have interviewed 8 girls and have 6 more who have completed their applications. It's always inspiring for me and our other volunteers to

interview the girls and hear about their lives, their ideas, and dreams for the future. Thanks to all the members who have helped so far with the interviews and with the schools. We have more girls than we can support at this time, so donations are still acceptable in any amount. #### Ballard High School—Joan Peterson


