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## Leadership Corner-Gay Armsden

What makes for a strong AAUW Branch? Number of members? Leadership excellence? Dedication to the mission? Member engagement? These are all powerful assets, of course. But *all* of them are vital for ensuring a strong and stable future for Seattle Branch. Behind each of these assets is a kind of cohesive force that makes it all work. Successful organizations have many members with strong ties to each other. People's feeling of social connection is strengthened through



shared experiences and belief in a shared mission, which becomes a kind of 'social glue'. Social glue binds organizations, whether they are non-profits, corporations or sports teams.

Some of us have been referring to our newly formed small social groups (SSG's) and the new-member socials as "social glue activities". The idea of increasing social glue in our branch came out of our strategic planning initiative a few years ago. Members have told the Board that as much as they were motivated to join AAUW because of its mission, many joined also to make new social connections. So we decided to create more opportunities to get to know one another.

Three of our SSG's are going strong so far. We expect more to get going after the holidays. Members seem to be having a lot of fun (Poetry readings! Great snacks!); but more than that, they're learning more about each other personally, finding common ground in concerns over social problems, vested interests, hobbies, and just wonderful new things about each other. Our monthly branch program – wonderful as it is - isn't as conducive to these things. The SSG's will no doubt evolve over time and, we hope, settle in to a feasible, ongoing branch activity.

Our annual new-members socials offer new members the opportunity to spend relaxed time with longer-term members, to become well-informed about branch programs and activities, and to learn how member engagement makes all the difference in branch vitality. Following these socials, we've seen our newest members take up leadership positions, join committees, and volunteer for branch activities. It's clear that many of the newest members felt an immediate connection with the branch and its members and an early sense of empowerment for helping to ensure its success. We are thrilled about that, and very much enjoyed getting to know them as well.

With more opportunities to socialize, together we can create mutual bonds of recognition, connectedness, and feelings of support for others in the branch as well the well-being of the branch itself. And have a fun time doing it!

# **MARY'S PLACE**



## November Branch Meeting—Judy Waring

This was our second year of having a joint November meeting with Edmonds/Sno-King Branch with a Humanities Washington speaker. This time we met at a new location, the Shoreline City Hall, where we had nice facilities and plentiful parking. Mayumi Tsutakawa of Humanities Washington spoke on "Five Women Warriors," Washington's undiscovered feminists from the past century.





early activist background, focused on housing. We learned the significant dates in Women's Suffrage and how our Washington was the fifth state to gain voting rights, ahead of the national 1920 date we'll be celebrating next year. She asked us why WA and the other states granting women the right to vote were all out West. The other question she asked, was "What is feminism?"

Then, Mayumi Tsutakawa proceeded to tell us about the five warriors: Imogen Cunningham, Priscilla Chong Jue, Vi Hilbert, Anna Louise Strong, and Ruby Bishop.

Questions and comments afterwards featured the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) and the Washington State Conference for Women that was held in Ellensburg in July 1977, attended by our speaker and a couple of others in the room. Some 4,000 women from around our state met on the campus of what is now Central Washington State University. Conservative and liberal feminists strongly disagreed about the ERA but pro-ERA delegates were elected to the national women's meeting held in Houston later that year.

First, we heard a bit

Edmonds/Sno-King provided the coffee and snacks. Our member Marianne North, who is a dual member with Edmonds Branch, coordinated the arrangements for our joint meeting. A couple of guests at the meeting requested AAUW membership information and one joined our branch. Many comments were heard of "Let's do this again next year."



## November Board Meeting—Rachel Foe

The Seattle Branch Board met on November 16, 2019 at the Lake Forest Bar and Grill after our excellent Branch meeting with speaker Mayumi Tsutakawa. Co-President Fiona Goodchild led the meeting and the Board began by discussing the Woman's March on January 18, 2020. It was brought to the Board's attention that AAUW could help sponsor the event and that it is scheduled for the same day as our branch meeting. The Board decided that Rachael Foe will meet with the Woman's March organizing team to gain understanding of what's needed and will report back to the Board. Then, Board members reviewed program plans for Branch meetings and solidified plans for the January and February meetings.

Judy Waring reported that we lost a few members that did not renew their membership and predicts our Branch will still have more than 93 registered members after November 30<sup>th</sup>. CJ Nash and Tonna Kutner reported about their efforts with our website and making it more mobile-friendly and searchable. Beverly Fogle presented our financial report and a questionnaire that she is filling out to support the preparation of our tax return. The next Board meeting will be held via conference call on Monday, December 9<sup>th</sup>.

## Tech Trek—Tonna Kutner

We are excited some of the Tech Trek girls we sponsored last summer will be at our December meeting to tell us about their experiences. You will be able to hear firsthand what camp is like and what it means to them.



TechTrek is an exciting week-long, residential, hands-on STEM camp for girls currently in 7th grade who show promise in math science and/or technology. It's held at Pacific Lutheran University in Tacoma where girls live in college dorms for a week during the summer and take classes from an excellent group of female scientists. The camp is designed to create interest, excitement, and confidence in young women.

All girls attend on sponsorships so there are no financial barriers to attending camp. There are many activities we need to complete before these girls can go to camp. One is to raise \$1,000 to sponsor each girl. You can help out by attending our Holiday Program on December 15th. Meet with old and new friends and help out Tech Trek at the same time. We'll be selling raffle tickets for some great baskets and all proceeds will go to sponsoring Tech Trek girls.

## Public Policy—Katherine Cleland

#### Lobby Day

Mark your calendars for Lobby Day, Monday January 27th at 8am at St. John's Episcopal Church, Olympia. Our morning speakers include Steve Breaux of Planned Parenthood who will speak on a bill to provide comprehensive, scientifically accurate, and age appropriate sex education in Washington's public schools. The proposed curriculum will include information about the importance of consent in sexual encounters. More details to follow as we know what bills have been proposed.

#### **Equal Rights Amendment**

The ERA is making rapid progress towards ratification, but needs our help. Virginia's new pro-equality legislature has proclaimed that ERA ratification will be early in the agenda of their new session. That makes them likely to be the 38th and final state needed to make the ERA a constitutional amendment. However, in 1972, when passed in congress, a deadline for ratification was added, and then revised. There are two bills in Congress today to REMOVE the DEADLINE. The house bill HJResolution79 had a hearing in the Judiciary Committee on Nov 13th, and was passed out of committee for full vote in the House. There are sufficient co-sponsors in the House to expect passage. The sister bill in the Senate has been introduced by Sen. Murkowski of Alaska. That bill, Senate Joint Resolution 6, needs us to make phone calls to our senators. Call Senators Murray and Cantwell and ask them to support the Senate Resolution SJRES6 to remove the deadline for the ERA by becoming a co-sponsor with Senator Murkowski, because there should never be a deadline on equality. I'm also happy to report that AAUW-Virginia has been a strong force in the push for Virginia to be the 38th and final state needed for ratification.

## Marketing & Communications Update: Branch Website Progress—CJ Nash

The Branch website can be one of our most important outreach tools, bringing in newcomers trying to find a Seattle group working for women's equity. But until recently, even a Google search on something like "AAUW Seattle" would not have sent someone to our website.

Since this summer, Tonna Kutner has worked hard to change that and has gotten results. She has also had help from member Katherine Cleland, whose business includes search engine optimization, commonly known as SEO.

Among the recent accomplishments:

- Discovering an unintentional instruction on our host site, AAUW National, that prevented search firms like Google from including us, and getting that removed. This was a huge change.
- Getting site analysis tools from Google that told her the many ways our site is not "mobile friendly," which reduces the outreach we might have. Now we know what needs to be fixed if we want more people to find us.
- Creating an updated site map and sending it to Google, so changes we've made to the site since 2016 are visible to Google's computers.
- Taking her findings to AAUW-Seattle's board with a plan for how we might move forward.

Recently, a search for us returned one of Google's top-of-page "featured snippets" – a box with our logo and website address, describing who we are. That's a direct result of this work. As Tonna moves forward, we'll keep you informed.
